Screening of "Chosen: Custody of the Eyes," a documentary film by Abbie Reece. An intimate portrait of a young woman in the process of becoming a cloistered contemplative nun, following the journey of Heather*, a former blogger and painter, who is renamed Sister Amata after she joins a religious community that traces to the medieval era. Religious studies professors have been particularly interested in this film — in which I lent the subject a video camera and worked with her to record the monastery and her own video diaries as she was in formation for a Poor Clare religious order that traces to Saint Francis; the nuns observe monastic silence, seek anonymity, and make a vow of enclosure.
